Course content	 Introduction: Review of Thesis Statement and Research objectives. Development of Research and Writing Log Module I: Literature Map/Outline: Students shall create and submit a literature map or outline that provides a comprehensive organizational structure for literature review. The map may include, empirical journal articles referenced and organized in this document books, editorials or other sources in addition to this requirement. Review, comments and guidance is provided by the supervisor. Module II: Introduction: Students shall submit a written draft of introduction explaining why this research is important or necessary, and describe the problem or situation that motivates the research. They have to discuss the current state of research in the field; then reveal a "gap" or problem in the field. Finally, students shall explain how the present research is a solution to that problem or gap. If the study has hypotheses, they are presented at the end of the 				





	introduction. Review, comments and guidance is provided by the		
	 supervisor. Module III: Methods: During this module students shall present and 		
	submit, the methods of conducting their study. Methods should		
	comply with their Thesis Statement Draft Proposal. Review,		
	comments and guidance is provided by the supervisor.		
	 Module IV: Results: During this module students shall present and 		
	submit, their findings. The results section should contains only the		
	findings, not any explanation of or commentary on the findings. Also it		
	should be written in the past tense. All tables and figures are labeled		
	and numbered separately. Review, comments and guidance is provided by the supervisor		
	 Module V: Discussion: During this module students shall present and 		
	submit, a summary of their main findings, comment on those findings, and how they connect to other research (if any). Also a discussion of limitations of their study, and use these limitations as reasons to		
	suggest additional, future research should be presented. Review, comments and guidance is provided by the supervisor		
	 Module VI: Abstract: Upon the completion of their research, students 		
	shall present and submit the abstract of their Thesis. The abstract		
	should provide a very short overview of the entire Thesis, including a		
	sentence or two about the Thesis's purpose and importance, a		
	sentence or two about their methods, a few sentences that present		
	the main findings, and a sentence or two about the implications of		
	their findings. The abstract should be placed in the beginning of the electronic and printed document. Review, comments and guidance is		
	provided by the supervisor.		
	 Module VII: Thesis Final Submission: During this module students 		
	shall submit printed copies of their Thesis, according to college's		
	instructions and requirements. The grading scale listed below is a		
	guide. The supervisor reserves the right to evaluate and		
	assign the final Thesis's grade

	present and communicate with a clear and academic manner their Thesis to a selected group of scholars. This may include (but not
